Saint Vincent School Develops New HEART Program

he HEART Program utilizes best practices in education in the area of discipline. Restorative Justice and Positive Behavior Support Systems are child-centered strategies that engage the student in social-emotional learning and revolve around the areas of discipline, trust, and relationships.

The following article appeared in the August 31, 2018 issue of the *Intermountain Catholic*:

Saint Vincent de Paul Parish School is starting the school year with a newly developed positive behavior incentive program called "St. Vincent HEART." HEART is an acronym for Helpful – Encouraging – Accepting – Responsible – Together, which are the positive descriptions chosen for the program to be modeled by the whole St. Vincent community including students, faculty, staff, parents, and volunteers.

"We have totally revamped our discipline program," said Vice Principal Sarah Lambert.

"I took a course this summer at Creighton University called Catholic Foundations and was really inspired by the emphasis they placed on school mission and charism. Our mission at St. Vincent is to recognize every person as a valued child of God, and we are dedicated to cultivating their minds and hearts. Our charisms focus on service and the unique community we have at St. Vincent. In reflection of this, I found the school's older system to be too punitive, which set up an adversarial relationship between the students and teachers. So I spent the summer working with Principal Gary Green and Student Support Team Member, Lisa Romero, on developing a unique program based on the ideas of **Restorative Justice and Positive Behavior** Support Systems."

In the St. Vincent HEART program, teachers recognize a student, staff member, or volunteer who models the HEART behaviors. When a teacher recognizes a student, they fill out a "St. Vincent's HEART" form to be displayed in the main school hallway. Each quarter, these forms move to the classrooms as more HEART forms are added to the main display. Also, teachers help students process their behavior by examining if their actions are safe, kind, and helpful.

"By focusing on positive behaviors and expectations, we set a new, more positive tone that connects so beautifully to our mission and charisms. The discipline system also works at creating and maintaining our community," said Lambert. "Instead of handing out warnings, our teachers will restate and reteach the routines and expectations. It fits in really well with the Catholic value of reconciling and restoring relationships. That is our focus, and that is what makes us special."

Principal Gary Green adds, "Despite the added effort that the HEART Program entails, teachers have embraced the program and are committed to its success."

Saint Vincent School Finds "Trouble in Friendlyville"

The eighth grade class at Saint Vincent de Paul Parish School presented the original musical play "Trouble in Friendlyville" on Thursday, November 17, 2017 with a daytime performance for the entire school and an evening performance for families. "Trouble in Friendlyville" was written and composed by the school's principal, Gary Green, with musical arrangements by Scott Larrabee, the school's band and choir teacher.

"Trouble in Friendlyville" is about a small town of pig ranchers in the old west that has recently lost their mayor in a pig stampede. The only two candidates, Phil Flowers (whose name strikes fear in the heart of everyone who hears it) and Maddy Lou Hardplow (who loves to eat and fight) are hardly the people the citizens expect to lead such a kindness-based town. The candidates compete in Friendlyville's Best Citizen Contest as a measure to see who is best qualified to be mayor. When some innocent children are in the path of a big pig stampede, Phil and Maddy really show their aptitude for the job.

"I love how the students took on this play as their own," Green said. "They created the backdrops and signs, thought of what props to use, came up with multiple suggestions for stage direction, and did



their own costuming. The eighth grade's ownership in the play is what made it such a valuable experience--that, and the fact that the playwright is a genius."

"It was fun being the first class to do a play with it just being our class. If they do another eight grade play that would be great for future classes to get to do something new. It was also very rewarding doing all the set designs and constructing them ourselves," said eighth grader Kelsie Kruckenberg. Classmate Piper Chenoweth added, "We got to put our own spin on it. Mr. Green let us do everything, and we got to do it the way we thought it should be done so it really was our play. It was so much fun; I wish it wasn't over."
