### We Are One Body Staff Retreat

St. Vincent de Paul Staff shook up their usual plans for back-toschool preparation and headed to Huntsville for their spiritual

retreat to rest, reconnect, and reflect before the new school year began.

At the site of the Trappist Monastery that has since been removed, the staff received a tour of the grounds given by Michael O'Brian (Author of the book: Monastery Mornings) who spent much time with the monks as a young boy.

Our Lady of Confidence statue elegantly overlooks the cemetery of monks who had given their lives in service of prayer. Their prayerful

spirit is still palpable in the green rolling hills and gentle serene breeze as the staff enjoyed quiet moments to pray, find fellowship, and reflect on St. Vincent's theme for the new school year: The Eucharist: We Are One Body.

They celebrated Mass at St. Florence Catholic Church with Fr. Sam Dinsdale, the new pastor at St. Vincent de Paul. Fr. Sam gave a reflection on the components of the Eucharistic Prayer and

together they adored the Blessed Sacrament and joined in song their anthem for the year: We Are One Body, One Body in Christ.

The echoes of this anthem shaped the entire day as team building activities shared creativity and laughter. Cohorts highlighted their accomplishments and celebrated one another's contributions. Each activity reenforced their dedication to the creed that they are all unique parts of Christ's body, serving one church.

The staff also received journals with a different personal saint to walk with for the year and another member of the staff to remember in their prayers. These thoughtful

details created prayerful intentions for the staff to enter into the new year with renewed hearts and minds.

"It's so important for us to come into the new school year with a renewed sense of purpose," says Gary Green, principal of St. Vincent de Paul, "God is so good to us. It was a great day to come together to prepare our hearts for the work ahead."



#### Camino de San Vicente

On April 28, 8th graders and teachers led students in grades kindergarten–7th grade on the "Camino de San Vicente," or the Way of Saint Vincent. The school's Faith Formation Committee based this school family activity on the Camino de Santiago. The students were told that since we all cannot travel to Spain for the big Camino, we would do a shortened version on our

campus. The goal of a pilgrimage is to become closer to God, and we can do that here.

The students began with this prayer: Lord, as you rose at Easter, please help us rise with You-to be closer to You, to be more like You, and to see You in places we have not seen You before, in particular to see You in other people. Help us to grow closer to You as we walk our Camino today.

Like the pilgrims on the Camino de Santiago who can receive a stamp

at different stops along the way, each student was given a sticker chart. At each of the 12 stops around campus, the family leaders read a different passage such as this one that was read when students arrived at the campus pond: The water in this pond gives life to the trees, bushes, and grass on our campus. Jesus gives us life, and gave us the promise of eternal life by rising on Easter morning. This Easter sticker reminds us of God's gift of life.

Another stop on the Camino de San Vicente was Nano Nagle Children's Center, which used to be the convent for the Sisters of the Blessed Virgin Mary who worked at St. Vincent's for 30 years. At this stop, the leader read: The sisters who lived at Nano Nagle for 30 years had great faith to move to another country to help children learn about God. They didn't know if St. Vincent School would do well or fail, but their faith in God helped them succeed.

We can do what the sisters did by following what this sticker says: "We walk by faith, not by sight."

Eighth grade family leader, Lexie Fisher, said, "When we did the Camino here at St. Vincent's, it helped us to not only feel connected to Jesus, but also with the school. Unfortunately, we weren't able to walk the real walk but the way we went all around campus made it seem like we were going all around the world. It was a blast for the

the world. It was a blast for the younger kids as they got stickers at each destination and it was a good way for us big kids to really feel connected to God. We had so much fun taking turns reading about how each place we stopped connected to the walk. It was so interesting and fun."

The school hopes that our students will remember the Camino de San Vicente for the rest of their lives, and that it will serve as a recurrent reminder that God is always with them.



#### **Farewell to Mrs. Howa-Johnson**

Monica Howa-Johnson, the 6th grade homeroom teacher, and middle school religion and social studies teacher, is leaving to be the campus minister at Judge Memorial Catholic High School. Monica taught 6th grade at St. Vincent for two years before taking a break to work at the diocese. After that, she returned to St. Vincent for 11 years. She is known for her expertise in technology,

being a Google Level 2 certified teacher. Monica is so skilled at technology that the diocese has asked her to lead technology seminars. Monica also is very well organized. Anyone who has ever substitute taught for her marvels at the clarity of her lessons.

However, her primary talent, that of bringing people closer to God, is ultimately what led to her take the new position. When Monica heard about the campus ministry position being open at Judge Memorial Catholic High School, she knew that this was what God was calling her to.

Monica said, "I will miss working alongside my St. Vincent's family - they are such a caring and wonderful community of support. At the same time, I am looking forward to the new challenges that the Judge Campus Ministry

position will bring. It will truly utilize all of my strengths and the things I most enjoy doing, like retreat and liturgy planning."

Sarah Lambert, the vice principal and leader of the middle

school cohort said, "Monica was an invaluable resource for our middle school and technology programs at St. Vincent. She was deemed our "Google Goddess," and worked really hard to help our students become proficient in tech skills that will serve them the rest of their educational and professional lives. Her dedication to imparting the Catholic faith to an age group who

continuously questions was also exceptional. She made our faith and its practices accessible to all of her students."

Zoe Becker, a student in 6th grade this past year wrote, "Mrs. Howa-Johnson was very kind, and was a great educator of the subjects she taught. I loved how she was very patient with the class and how she made every day things fun and interactive, like attendance, and jobs. She was very welcoming the day that I first started middle school, and she made me feel like part of the middle school community right away. I am sad to see her go, but can't wait to see her at Judge Memorial High School!"

"Monica is funny, completely at ease teaching people, and is an excellent musician," Principal Gary Green wrote. "She uses these

talents to engage people about Catholicism. I know that the students at Judge will benefit greatly from her presence there. I am very sad to lose Monica, but I am happy for her and for Judge."



## **Second Step Program**

In the Spring of 2023, St. Vincent de Paul Parish School began investigating social emotional learning programs. The faculty and administration chose the Second Step program, and school-wide implementation will begin in the Fall of 2023.

Second Step is a social-emotional learning curriculum that St. Vincent de Paul Parish School is applying school-wide this year. Second Step is designed to help students build skills for success both in and out of the classroom.

St. Vincent School has been teaching and practicing social-emotional learning for many years, but by using the Second Step program specifically, we are able to have a uniform guide which everyone is able to access. This program allows our teachers, staff, students, and families to use the same language when talking about feelings and empathy. By using Second Step, our students can build their

confidence and competence to make good decisions, manage emotions, and take on learning challenges.

The Second Step program promotes emotional well-being, academic success, and positive behavior. These skills can be used

throughout the students' lives, inside and outside of the classroom. Second Step builds on itself and evolves as the students move from PreK all the way through 8th grade.

The four main units of study in the elementary school are Growth Mindset and Goal Setting; Emotion Management; Empathy and Kindness; and Problem-Solving. In the middle school, the four units of study are Mindsets and Goals; Recognizing Bullying and Harassment; Thoughts, Emotions, and Decisions; and Managing Relationships and Social Conflict.

At St. Vincent de Paul, we will be adding these Second Step lessons to our monthly virtue and Schoolwide Learning Expectations. By combining all of these

teachings, our students are able to grow not just spiritually, but also emotionally and socially.



## **Advisory Curriculum Prepares Middle School Students for 21st Century**

In the summer of 2022, St. Vincent de Paul's Middle School revamped their Advisory Curriculum. The new and improved objective of this program is to prepare students with academic, social, and emotional skills so that they may engage the local and global community with 21st century skills. The term "21st Century Skills" has become a popular topic in education over the last few years. These sessions are intended to help students develop skill sets that higher learning institutions and employers find desirable. Things like interpersonal skills, communication, and problem solving are included in a variety of workshops each Friday in Advisory.

Each quarter, members of our middle school team present sessions on goal setting, team building,



skills, and interpersonal skills. Students received punch cards and were given the choice to select which session to go to during a given set of weeks. The sessions helped students identify strengths and skills. The objective of which is to create a toolbox of 21st Century Skills on which they can build as they progress in our middle school, high school, college, and career.

Throughout the year, we focused on many 21st Century Skills. Sessions included presentations and activities on team building and relationships, personality traits, identifying people and resources in their personal Circle of Help, and identifying personal strengths.

Other topics included:

- Communication skills: written and verbal skills, body language, settling disagreements, making apologies, using tone and pragmatic language, and goal setting/reflection.
- Interpersonal skills: identifying social cues and perspectives, perspective taking, conflict resolution, being a good friend, problem sizing and problem solving, decision making, cooperative learning, self-awareness and accepting consequences.

Moving forward, the middle school staff will continue to focus on cultivating these skills, and help students to develop a portfolio that they can refer to and utilize as they continue forward in their educational and career pathways.

## **Annual Appeal: Staff Stipend Fund**

The average starting salary for a teacher in Granite School District (the district in which St. Vincent's resides) is \$20,000 more than the starting salary for teachers in the Utah Catholic Schools. This amount stays consistent for teachers with Master's Degrees and 10 years experience. Other surrounding school districts such as Canyons and Salt Lake City have even higher starting salaries. Obviously, this makes it very difficult to recruit and retain teachers.

The quality of our work environment and the tuition discount help, but people's bills have to be paid. And, when a teacher is deciding between staying in a Catholic school or better providing for their children, they sometimes leave our school.

We are asking for your help by giving to the Staff Stipend Fund. While we cannot deviate from the Utah Catholic Schools Salary Scale, we are able to give stipends when staff members perform tasks that are beyond their job description.

Your tax-deductible donation will allow us to increase the number of stipend opportunities, and hopefully help the school recruit and retain teachers. It is a strong staff that makes for a great school, so please give generously.

Gary Green, principal of St. Vincent School, said, "Clearly, this is not Fr. Sam's first rodeo when it comes to being a school administrator. Within two days of starting his assignment here, Fr. Sam had to deal with a difficult issue, and he handled it with wisdom. Fr. Sam supports us in any way we need, and he is enjoyable to work with. We are lucky to have Fr. Sam as our pastor!"



### **Penny Wars and Generous Hearts**

The newly elected student council at St. Vincent de Paul came ready for school with a heart on fire for helping others. President Jack Clark and Vice President Lexie Fisher talk about their heart for helping St. Vincent de Paul's sister school in Kitale, Kenya: St. Emmanuel.

"We have a very easy life here in America and they have a really rough life," Lexie admits.

For example, at St. Emmanuel's, boots are provided to the children who attend. When it rains, children attending prior to these gifts would have to walk in water and mud to school and back bare footed. Porridge is also given to the students as many children miss breakfast which forces them to look for food or go to school hungry. Providing porridge motivates them to attend school regularly and get the education they need.

"They don't have shoes and they have to walk a really long way to school. We're really lucky to have transportation. We feel it's the least we can do to





support them by raising money."

St. Vincent's raised \$141 at the end of last school year for St. Emmanuel's but when they didn't raise as much money as they were hoping to, it was decided that they do another fundraiser this year.

They chose to do a fundraiser called "Penny Wars" to engage the classes and encourage competitive giving to see who could outdo the other in generosity. Each class was given a bin outside their classrooms, and each class could put as many pennies as possible into their own bin. The catch was that they

could add paper money or bigger coins to another class's bin and it would subtract the points that class earned. This was great fun for the students who loved to play the game of winning for others!

Gary Green, principal of St. Vincent de Paul Parish School said, "What's most exciting to me was the students' motivation to raise as much money as they could for what they know is a worthy cause. I love when the students' actions and understanding match the charism of St. Vincent de Paul."

Overall, the students raised \$2,047 for St. Emmanuel's School in Kitale, Kenya. The proceeds will go towards purchasing school supplies and uniforms for the students. "We're very happy doing everything we can to help them," says Lexie, "They're a pretty awesome school."
