



St. Vincent's Presentation Sisters Garden

n Saturday, June 21, members of the St. Vincent de Paul Parish School community, led by Fr. Sam Dinsdale, gathered to celebrate the blessing of our new Presentation Sisters Garden. The garden was named after the Presentation Sisters of the Blessed Virgin Mary from Ireland. Five Presentation Sisters came to St. Vincent's in 1965 at the invitation of Bishop Joseph Federal to help run and staff the school. The Sisters continued to work in and build up the St. Vincent Community until 1994 when they were moved to other ministries out of state. Despite the over 30-year gap between their departure, the Sisters are still beloved in this community.

During the garden blessing, Chef Debora Crandall read an excerpt from the book Frog and Toad Together. Toad wants to grow a garden as grand as Frog's, and Frog advises Toad to take care of the seeds and let the sun and rain help them. Eventually, Toad's seeds sprout, and he realizes a successful garden is hard, but fulfilling work.

Glenda Gurney, former 3rd grade teacher, told many stories about the Presentation Sisters. These stories showed the love between the students and teachers, and the Sisters.

The vision for the garden began many years ago, and this past spring, the school community raised the needed funds. With the creativity and guidance of Chef Debora, the dream quickly took root. Thanks to the generous donations from our supporters, what began as eight garden beds has expanded into more than 24. In the middle of the garden stands a beautiful cross, once on the roof of Holy Family Hall, now serving as a beautiful reminder of faith and gratitude. At the foot of the cross is a plaque with the names of all the Presentation Sisters who worked at St. Vincent de Paul Parish School.

Currently, the perennial beds are becoming well-established and will bring even more benefits next year. Many are designed to support pollinators, while others are filled with exciting plants like thornless blackberries, strawberries, artichokes, asparagus, grapes, and a variety of herbs. The vegetable beds are also ready for action, complete with a drip irrigation system to ensure the plants get the water they need to flourish.

The Presentation Sisters Garden is designed to grow not only vegetables and plants, but also to develop our students' knowledge and sense of community. Every student at St. Vincent's has had the opportunity to participate in the garden this past spring, whether by planting seeds, bringing in soil or mulch, weeding, or watering. This hands-on experience has already been a blessing for our students, and will continue to be for years to come.

This special space is more than just a garden to our school—it is a living classroom, and a sacred place where faith, learning, and love come together. It is truly a gift to see this garden growing—not just in plants, but in the experiences it will offer our children.

This garden stands as a living tribute to the Presentation Sisters of the Blessed Virgin Mary, whose deep love, faith, and tireless dedication helped shape the heart of St. Vincent de Paul Parish School from 1965 to 1994. Cheerleading Program Brings Spirit & Leadership

t. Vincent de Paul Parish School has always been known for its strong sense of faith, academics, and community. In recent years, it has also become home to a vibrant cheerleading program that has quickly grown into a cornerstone of school spirit, thanks to the vision and dedication of its founder, Coach Jill Hrechkosy.

What began as a simple idea to give students another way to express pride in their school has transformed into a fully developed program that supports athletics, builds leadership, and fosters lifelong skills. The St. Vincent Vikings Cheerleading Program now includes both Junior Varsity (1st-4th graders) and Varsity (5th-8th graders) squads. With practices twice a week, the cheerleaders not only learn chants, motions, and routines but also the values of teamwork, perseverance, and responsibility.

"Cheerleading is about so much more than just cheers on the sidelines," said Coach Jill. "It's about confidence, leadership, social responsibility and building a community where every child feels they belong."

The program has already made an impact at school events, from energizing the sidelines of games to bringing excitement to community traditions like the First Day of School Cheer Line. One highlight of the year is the leadership development built into practices, where cheerleaders engage in lessons on social responsibility, public speaking, and mentorship. Older students step into captain and co-captain roles, helping

to guide younger teammates both on and off the mat.

This fall, the program welcomed a new assistant coach, Lindsay Kaufman-Foren, who works alongside Coach Jill. With parent volunteers and community support, the program continues to expand its reach, offering students new opportunities like clinics with guest choreographers and special stunt workshops.

Parents and teachers alike have praised the cheerleading program for the joy and confidence it brings to the children. "It's wonderful to see our students not only performing but growing in their leadership and faith through this program," shared one St. Vincent parent.

Looking ahead, the Vikings Cheerleaders will continue to take part in school rallies, parish events, and special performances, including an upcoming appearance in the school's talent show. Last Christmas, the team raised \$1,407 for the Huntsman Cancer Institute, and in the spring, they collected nearly \$500 for the Mother's Day Diaper Drive benefiting the Utah Diaper Bank. Sponsorship opportunities and community partnerships also help sustain the program and provide uniforms, gear, and training.

In just a short time, St. Vincent de Paul's cheerleading program has become more than an extracurricular activity—it's a movement of spirit, service, and school pride. Through Coach Jill's leadership and the dedication of the athletes, the program is leaving a lasting legacy for future generations of Vikings.

Alumni Spotlight • Zoe Murphy

s Zoe enters her senior year at Tulane University, she reflects on the foundations of her success—and many of them lead back to St. Vincent de Paul Parish School. Zoe is currently pursuing a major in

Information Technology and Computer Science, and has spent her summer interning with Barclays Bank in Cybersecurity. She has received a return offer from Barclays and is planning on working with them after graduation. This opportunity, she says, was in part made possible by the confidence she built at St. Vincent's.

Zoe attended St. Vincent's from 3rd -8th grade. She happily remembers the tight-

knit community and the powerful impression that her teachers and classmates made on her. The friendships she made at St. Vincent's are still going strong, as she regularly talks to and spends time with her former classmates.

Looking back on middle school, Zoe feels this was the time she really started honing in on science, math, and technology. Teachers like Mrs. Eischeid and Mrs. Sloan helped challenge her and helped her to develop STEM skills she's still using today.

Zoe also recalls her years at St. Vincent's as a journey in faith formation. Being in our school helped

lay the groundwork for her Catholic faith. Similar to most students her age, she recalls not necessarily being excited to go to Mass, but getting in the habit strengthened her faith and appreciation for quiet

reflection. Zoe was an altar server, and her involvement in Mass made that time feel meaningful and fun.

This early involvement stayed with her through her years at Judge Memorial Catholic High School, and now at Tulane, she is an active leader at the Tulane Catholic Center. She cites her Confirmation journey, religion classes, and regular exposure to homilies as key experiences that instilled

values she still carries today. "Facing challenges with a mindset of selflessness—putting others first—that's something I try to do, and it all started back at St. Vincent's," she says.

When asked to share a message with current St. Vincent students, Zoe said to "truly enjoy your time at Vincent's. Get to know everyone at the school because everyone is your friend and they care for you." Zoe shared that she is grateful for the community at the school because it gave her a solid foundation of values and friendships.

Girls Empowerment and Running League (GERL)

his year, St. Vincent's applied for and received the Utah Children's Outdoor Recreation and Education (UCORE) grant. This grant provided up to \$15,000 to use towards Girls on the Run participation fees and other fun extras. With this funding, we created the "Girls Empowerment and Running League." GERL engaged students in grades 3–7 in a powerful blend of fitness, outdoor education, and personal growth. Participants in grades 3–5 followed

the Girls on the Run curriculum, while middle schoolers explored the Heart & Sole program—both provided by Girls on the Run Utah. The lessons were designed to meet girls of all abilities where they are, encouraging them to discover their strengths, build confidence, and develop lifelong skills.

Our coaches Anna Zanarini, Kelly Love, Christy Walthius, and Alicia Sloan along with our junior coach, Macey Love, guided the girls through sessions that combined physical activity with meaningful discussions about teamwork, empathy, managing emotions, and building friendships. Twice weekly, participants gained a deeper sense of belonging and

connection while strengthening both body and mind. Of course, each session wasn't complete without a glass of delicious chocolate milk and a fun cheer.

Throughout the eight-week program, all 16 sessions were held outdoors, making the most of St. Vincent's beautiful campus. Activities included warm-ups, teambuilding games, and movement ranging from walking and skipping to running. We were also lucky enough to have outdoor educator Hilary Lambert lead a special day of learning, introducing the girls to mindfulness, breathing, reflection, and collaboration in nature.

Along with learning, service and community impact were another important part of our GERL program. With guidance from Chef Debora, the girls spent a



day in our new Presentation Sisters Garden, planting seeds, watering beds, and creating signs for the garden — an experience that connected them to both the land and each other.

The season culminated in the celebratory Girls on the Run 5K held at Sugarhouse Park, where every girl crossed the finish line with a sense of pride and accomplishment. Our team was able to sport their new GERL gear, provided by Eagle Eye Promotions and

covered by grant funding.

Our final celebration took place at the St. Vincent Pavilion where we had music, a soda bar, delicious race themed cookies and other treats. There, we also held a drawing for a backpack donated by Pingora, along with a caricature artist who delighted the girls with cartoon portraits.

Through the Girls on the Run and Heart & Sole curriculum, GERL offered our students far more than a running program. It created a safe and uplifting environment where girls could express themselves openly, discover their strengths, and build the confidence to thrive.

St. Vincent's Celebrates Positive Behaviors

t. Vincent de Paul Parish School practices Positive Behavior Support Systems (PBSS) to influence desirable behaviors in students. Many behavior studies have found that positive reinforcements and recognitions are more effective at influencing behavior than those traditional punitive consequences with which Catholic schools are sometimes associated.

St. Vincent celebrates student behavior in three ways:

HEARTS

Teachers recognize a student for following school-wide and classroom expectations and rules. They recognize students who practice the charism of charity, as modeled by Christ and St. Vincent de Paul. When a teacher recognizes a student for these behaviors, the teacher fills out a "St. Vincent's HEART" form. This form will be displayed in the hallway and sent home at the end of each quarter.

Victorious Viking Award

This award recognizes positive behaviors, academics, SLE achievements, etc. They are given at the teacher's discretion, but other faculty and staff can nominate students based on positive interactions. These nominees are recognized by members of the Admin Team on a visit to the classroom. Their behavior is recognized and reinforced in front of the classroom community. They pick a prize and have a picture taken. The Admin Team will share the picture digitally to the teacher. The teacher sends the picture and a description of the behavior to

the student's parents via email.

Viking Helmet Award

The school recognizes special achievements in behavior with the highly-coveted Viking Helmet Award. This award is best owed upon individuals who

demonstrate exceptional

behavior that

transcends traditional expectations in the realms of kindness, helpfulness, and safety. This award celebrates those whose actions and attitudes

embody persons of St. Vincent, St. Louise de Marillac, and Christ through compassion, community support, and a commitment to ensuring the well-being of others.

Nominations can be submitted by anyone who has witnessed the nominee's exceptional behavior. The school Admin Team reviews all nominations and selects the most deserving individual based on the outlined criteria. Following a celebration of the weekly school Mass, the recipient is honored in the presence of peers, leaders, and community members, and receives a 3D printed Viking Helmet.


